#### Have you heard this one?

We are familiar with the names of the Battle of Britain aircraft and they all do seem so appropriate. However, if it had not been for Annie Penrose, RAF pilots might have found themselves piloting Shrews instead of Spitfires in the Battle of Britain. Annie's father, Sir Robert McLean, was chairman of Vickers between the wars and worked closely with R J Mitchell who was designing a new single-seater fighter. Mitchell had wanted to call the new plane the Shrew, but McLean insisted it was called the Spitfire, the nickname he had bestowed on his somewhat headstrong daughter. Can you imagine a Shrew taking on the Luftwaffe? Would we still enjoy watching BoB Flight Shrews doing air displays? Mitchell was a genius aircraft designer, but he was obviously not so good at names.

The families' 17-year battle to clear the names of Flight Lieutenants Richard Cook and Jonathan Tapper who were based at RAF Odiham finally paid off.

A gross injustice has been put right at last.

#### **Branch Membership summary**

At the Branch meeting on 7th November, Maureen provided a breakdown of the current branch membership. Our membership currently comprises

146 members in total comprising:

### **Vulcan Update**

The Vulcan had a run of bad luck this summer starting on 16 August with a fuel tank leak. These are not unheard of, but the tank has to be completely drained of fuel and then ventilated with an air blower overnight so that a small fitter can then enter the tank (through a 14in by 14in opening) and release the securing buttons of the flexible fuel bag that lines the tank cavity. After that, the tank liner can be gently removed from the aircraft and dispatched to Fireproof Tanks of Portsmouth. Repairs were completed on Friday 26th August. However, after take off on Sunday 28th, en route to the Dunsfold Wings and Wheels display, the aircraft suffered a hydraulic problem that necessitated a precautionary landing at RAF Conningsby. Although the aircraft was repaired and ready to display on Sunday 4th September, the weather took a turn for the worse and XH 558 (with only a VFR clearance, I.e. clear of cloud) was grounded for the weekend.

The loss of 10 scheduled displays over 3 weekends due to 2 separate technical problems and then bad weather put an immediate and enormous strain on the Trust's cash flow, leaving it with a £100,000 hole that no-one expected. The Trust has had to bring forward its plans for the Winter and have announced how supporters can become directly involved in supporting XH558 through some new initiatives, e.g.

• Membership of the 'Component Life Register' for supporting the winter service (see more details on page 11)

• The opportunity to send Her Majesty The Queen a country-wide message of good wishes for her Diamond Jubilee through a unique 'Salute to Her Majesty' campaign.

• A 'Friends Scheme' that will honour past donors and give priority and privileged access to events and XH558 herself.

• Hangar Tours and Events, where visitors can meet members of the dedicated engineering team and get close to the aircraft.

• Special 'limited edition' merchandise and aircraft parts

XH 558 is always hungry - for money. All the transitional problems of turning a retired military bomber into a civil air display aircraft have been solved. However, the Vulcan was never built for economy and so the main task of the Trust now is thinking up new ways to get people to part with their money. # Letter from the Chairman of the Central Council

A recent letter to members from Nigel Bairsto, Chairman of the Central Council, first referred to the 2010 Annual Review, "Making a Difference" which tells the stories of the Association's work. (This is available online at:

www.rafa.org.uk/annualreview or through Branch Secretaries). He then addressed how the Association intends to deliver on the 6 strategic objectives of the Association. These are:

- Membership we all need to work hard at recruiting (and Basingstoke Branch has met its target of 8 this year)
- Welfare adapting our services to meet the changing needs of the RAF family
- Fundraising increasing our Wings Appeal donations and developing new sources of income

- 4. **People** investing in volunteers and staff to support our work
- 5. **Business performance** ensuring that time and money given by our volunteers and donors is used efficiently
- 6. **Reputation** making sure that we are recognised as a strong, effective charitable Association.

The letter ended by emphasising the importance of having people with the right skill sets on the Central Council Committee. A new way of electing members to this Committee must reflect a requirement to work

#### Vulcan component shares - status as at 18 Nov

The component share scheme sells shares for each of the major components needed for the Winter service. For example, in the table below they need to raise  $\pounds$ 50,000 for serviced Brake Parachutes and there are 1,000 shares (2)  $\pounds$ 50 each. So far they have sold 242 shares, I.e. 24% of shares available.

Overall, the component budget is £195,000 and 1,620 shares have been sold 7,300 still available. So funding to date is £45,410, only 23% of what is needed. Fire Suppression, NDT Inspections and Oxygen Systems remain the components well behind all others. The Vulcan Trust say, "Can you support us and make the ideal Christmas present? #### Who said, "The Good Old Days"? Office regulations for a Burnley Cotton Mill in 1852

- \* Godliness, cleanliness and punctuality are the necessities of good business.
- \* This firm has reduced the hours of work and the clerical staff will now only have to be present between the hours of 7am and 6pm.
- \* Daily prayers will be held each morning in the main office. The clerical staff will be present.
- \* Clothing must be of a sober nature. The clerical staff will not dispose themselves in raiment of bright colours, nor will they wear hose, unless in good repair.
- \* Overshoes and top-coats may not be worn in the office but neck scarves and head wear may be worn in inclement weather.
- \* A stove is provided for the benefit of clerical staff. Coal and wood must be kept in the locker. It is recommended that each member of the clerical staff bring in four pounds of coal each day during cold weather.
- \* No member of the clerical staff may leave the room without permission from Mr Rogers. The calls of nature are permitted and the clerical staff may use the garden below the second gate. The area must be kept in good order.

- \* No talking is allowed during business hours.
- \* The craving for tobacco, wines or spirits is a human weakness and as such is forbidden to all members of the clerical staff.
- \* Now that the hours of business have been so drastically reduced, the partaking of food is only allowed between 11.30am and noon, but work will not, on any account, cease.
- \* Members of the clerical staff will provide their own pens. A new sharpener is available on application to Mr Rogers.
